Enjoy the Classic Vehicle Group's Drive-it-Day run in south and mid-Hampshire Sunday 25th April 2021

The Federation of British Historic Vehicle Clubs' Drive it Day events take place nationwide, providing the opportunity to dust off those cobwebs, and give our classics an early-season test run. As the role of the FBHVC and of the historic movement evolves, they wish to promote awareness of the need to contribute to wider society, and



they have announced that in 2021, the events will be run in support of the NSPCC's Childline R service, and a voluntary donation can be made towards the organisation's work if desired. The CVG run will explore a new route in Hampshire, passing through some of the best countryside in the newly-designated South Downs National Park and finishing at the Royal Armouries' Fort Nelson, on the hills above Portsmouth, with its military collections and wonderful sea views.

Starting in mid Hants, convenient for A3 and A3(M), there will be a selection of breakfast options, and after a short briefing cars will head for our first visit of the day, which we hope will have a specialist classic vehicle and transport related focus. Details will be worked up in the New Year, depending on the situation at that time, and the feasibility of early season events and locations.

Moving on through the ancient town of Alresford, with many opportunities for lunch in pubs and restaurants as well as outside locations, we will turn southwards on country roads through the beautiful Meon Valley to Bishop's Waltham, with its ruined medieval Bishop's Palace, riverside, and open spaces, restaurants and coffee shops, before passing through the Forest of Bere and reaching our final destination.

This will be Fort Nelson, a huge building constructed in Victorian times to counter possible threats of French invasion, but never actually used, except as an anti-aircraft establishment in World War II and in its present armoury collections role. The Fort looks out for miles across the City and Portsmouth Harbour, and the sea views will be breathtaking if the weather is kind to us. We will be able to park within the grounds, view the collections, and refreshments are available.

Entry fee will be £40 per car and two occupants to include:



We have been invited to a guided tour of The National Museum of Computing which is in the grounds of, but separated from, Bletchley Park Estate. It houses the world's largest collection of functional historic computers, including the rebuilt Colossus, the



world's first electronic computer, and the WITCH, the world's oldest working The digital computer. museum enables visitors to follow development of computing from the ultra-secret pioneering efforts of the 1940s through to the large systems and mainframes of the 1950s, 60s and and the rise of personal computing in the 1980s and beyond.

One of the volunteer guides for the day will be Sheridan Williams, whom many of you will have met on our

display stand at the NEC two years ago with his Sunbeam Tiger.

The Motorcycle is the Star

As with so many people of the post WWII era, the baby boomers, by the time I had reached my teenage years I craved for the independence of being able to travel without having to rely on public transport or my push-bike. To do so necessitated my buying either a motorbike or a scooter – my having previously ruled-out purchasing a moped which, in those days, invariably came complete with a wickerwork shopping basket attached to the handlebars! With limited financial means, (I was earning the paltry sum of £3 a week as a trainee motor mechanic), my budget was set at just £5 with which I purchased a humble 1951 BSA Bantam D1, with an insipid 125cc power unit. Even so, I truly thought that I was King of the Road. Ownership was short-lived as it was stolen from outside my flat, later to be recovered minus several engine components.

Four wheels replaced two but the desire to enjoy the freedom that can only be experienced on two wheels returned some years later when, by this time, the Japanese had seriously broken into the UK market. I was then working in central London and two wheels was the cheaper and preferred alternative to the daily crush of the daily commute by train. There followed a succession of Honda 250cc Super Dreams but this came to an abrupt end when, on undertaking a stationary double-decker bus, I lost control of the machine causing the front wheel to slide from beneath me due to a diesel spillage on the road. I was immediately thrown onto the tarmac, away from the bus, with the Honda going in the opposite direction – to be fatally crushed by its rear wheels. That's enough, I thought and decided, there and then, that my two-wheel days were over. However once a motorcyclist, always a motorcyclist and some years later I wrestled with the thought that I could ride-out on two wheels purely for enjoyment's sake! By this time the bank balance was more stable and with a wide choice of machines available I decided, firstly, to buy new and, secondly, to buy something along

traditional British design lines. Design is one thing, the country of origin is another and I opted to buy a new 2002, single cylinder, 500cc Royal Enfield Bullet of Indian manufacture. In addition to riding it I also displayed it at motor/motorcycle shows where it certainly confused onlookers who could not determine if it was old or new – made all the more difficult for them as I had registered it with a period number plate from the 1960s.

Historic aviation has always been a passion of mine, (I'm the bloke



who flew in a two-seater Spitfire, with a subsequent report of the experience published in the October 2015 edition of Squeaky Wheel), and on tuning my radio into BBC Essex there was mention of a fast taxi-run, the following weekend, of an Avro Vulcan bomber at Southend Airport. This was an opportunity not to be missed! I arrived on the Enfield,

was immediately directed to a gathering of motorcycles and invited to lead a procession down the runway, in the wake of the Vulcan. I had been selected as I had the oldest looking bike, though it was barely eight years old at the time! Fifteen motorcycles fanned-out behind me adopting the shape of the Vulcan's iconic delta wing. What a memory!

Delightful as the Bullet was its riding characteristics were, truly, agricultural. I found it a bit of a handful, especially with the heavy, clunky, gear change so after six years of ownership I found myself window-shopping in a Triumph motorcycle dealership. My eyes fell on an 865cc Bonneville which was a dream to ride; it was refined, quieter, vibration-free and infinitely more powerful – and it still possessed the looks of a classic British bike! I have never considered myself a dyed in the wool motorcyclist; my annual mileage is barely 1000 miles – though that is 1000 miles of pure enjoyment. Upon



purchasing the Bonneville I went on rideouts with the local Triumph Owners' Club and was invited by them to commemorate the fallen UK servicemen who had sacrificed their lives in Afghanistan. This was to be achieved with a police-escorted ride down Wootton Basset High Street on 14 March 2010. We had all assembled, for

the purpose, at RAF Lyneham from where we departed, at intervals. 500 motorcycles were due to take part; in the event the cavalcade attracted 2000 participants. Wootton Bassett hadn't previously seen anything like it! To say that the event was a moving

experience would be an under-statement. The high street was thronged with visitors who applauded the motorcycles as they passed by, servicemen wearing their military blazers berets threw and salutes and the children held their hands out to be slapped as passed them by. The



empathy of the occasion was certainly enough to bring a tear to one's eye.

Sadly, my motorcycling days are drawing to a close. I now find that locking my knees in the same position, for lengthy periods of time, is painful and I'm unable to twist my neck, owl fashion, to clearly see other vehicles around me. Still, I have the memories and the photographs which I will forever cherish.

The Car is the Star

Newly retired, two lifelong friends Rob Bloom and Chris Lines had the feeling that time was running out and if there was anything they wanted to do, they ought to do it sooner, rather than later. As motoring enthusiasts, their thoughts turned towards a classic car; although one upgraded with more power and properly sorted handling, braking etc. Several glasses of Merlot later and the pair were captivated by the idea of an Austin A35 with a V8 engine. Could it be done? Legend said that it had been in the past, but always in the guise of a hot rod.



However, Rob and Chris were clear they wanted a vehicle that would still retain the appearance of a standard A35.



Opinions were sought from a variety of automotive contacts and the majority opinion was that they were mad. Nevertheless, one (Nick), not only agreed it was a very enticing idea, but had soon formulated an outline plan of how it could be brought to fruition. Luckily, the two friends had the good sense to back his judgement and so the project was born, with Nick undertaking the lion's share of the build.

The ensuing four year journey began with a Lotus Excel, a partially restored A35 and a 5 litre Ford V8 engine; and has ended with exactly what Rob and Chris had in mind when the project was conceived.

Unsurprisingly, numerous engineering challenges were encountered on the way, but the group's combined knowledge, experience (and guesstimates), have enabled their vision to be turned into reality.

The Lotus Excel proved to be an inspired choice (thanks Nick), as it has supplied the gearbox, and chassis (shortened and narrowed), as well as the majority of suspension and brake components. Most problems during the build related to sheer



lack of space and squeezing everything in. However, controlling engine temperature



has also proved challenging, along with routing the exhausts and setting up the suspension.

Rob and Chris are convinced that first impressions count. So it's no surprise that plenty of attention has been given to the bodywork in order to achieve the finish they were looking for, while retaining its original 1950's patina. The car has certainly received

a lot of spraying and polishing! A similar amount of thought went into the interior and the pair were fortunate to find someone locally who not only provided good advice, but also has done an excellent job with the trim.

One of the car's first outings saw it displayed on the Boundless Stand at the Silverstone Classic Show in 2019. Its quality of workmanship generated plenty of positive comment there, as well as a few surprised looks – not least because the exhaust note is somewhat different to a standard A35's, despite its peashooter tailpipe!

The car has also proved to be good to drive; yet incremental improvements continue to be made,





such as the recent addition of a heater and further refinements to the handling and brakes. With 330bhp on tap, the A35 is certainly quick. Even so, it is equally happy simply poodling down to the shops.

For Rob and Chris, the project has been a fascinating and rewarding journey; and one they are confident will deliver many more years of enjoyment in the future.

Update from 30th September Club Council Meeting

The Club Council met for their 73rd Meeting via Zoom and were joined by our new Chief Operating Officer, Pete Worster who now has overall responsibility for the Membership operational functions within Boundless.

As usual the Interest Group Leaders and the Local Group Representatives provided updates on the activities of their Groups – which of course sadly has been greatly curtailed recently due to the current circumstances. However, there have been some successes, with a few motoring events still able to be held, plus a couple of caravan rallies and a planned Social Break. Our Local Groups have possibly been hit hardest as the majority of their events inevitably involve a sociable element to a large degree that has either been best avoided or indeed more recently, made illegal following the 'rule of 6' implementation.

However, the good news is, that in true Boundless spirit, several of our Groups have been able to continue enjoying the participation and friendship our activities provide for members, bringing groups together for socially distanced lunches, socially distanced motorcycle rides, online quizzes and 'Zoom' meetings. Clearly, these activities will never compare to the sociable gatherings our Groups have thrived upon, but for the time being, they're the best alternative!

As part of the Club Finance update, Gerard O'Sullivan, Club Treasurer detailed the progress the Groups budgeting process was making and reminded all Groups that the deadline for the submission of 2021 Budget Proposals is Friday 9th October. Gerard also updated the Club Council on the agreed revisions to the Honoraria payments to be introduced this year. These will be detailed in the relevant invitations sent to eligible claimants during October.

Independent Council Member, Martin Fearn updated the Club Council on the progress being made towards achieving the Investors in Volunteers accreditation. The initial assessment has been completed and this has led to an appropriate Development Plan being drawn up. The next stage will be the implementation of the Development Plan and then a series of informal volunteer interviews, currently scheduled for April 2021.

Club Leader, Madeleine Grubb updated the Club Council as to the necessary postponement of the Groups Networking Meetings originally planned for the Autumn. These have now been moved back until next Spring. Instead, Madeleine will be hosting a series of online updates, via Zoom, with members to update them on the current situation within the Club and also to answer any questions members may have, that they would more normally have asked as part of one of our Networking Meeting Q&A sessions.

Audio Dial in to Zoom Calls

As we move into an uncertain 2021 it is likely that we all will continue to budget to make use of virtual meeting facilities being provided by Zoom. Club Treasurer, Gerard O'Sullivan therefore would like to draw members attention to the facility whereby telephone audio dial-in is also available as part of a Zoom video call invitation.

Access to the Zoom call by audio is usually offered on a range of possible dial-in numbers as part of the invitation typically as follows:

Calls to these numbers can often be free as part of the caller's all-inclusive call package on a UK mobile or other UK landline service. However, that may also not be the case and in that case a significant call charge may be accrued.

Gerard would therefore advise that any members dialling in on audio should make sure they are aware of any charges likely to arise from dialling from a landline or mobile into the Zoom call and that they confirm these costs with their Group Treasurer prior to incurring these charges.
