

The A-Z of Curious Norfolk

For our February talk we had Sarah Doig give us her look at some of the curious things which have taken place in Norfolk. Sarah is interested in several aspects of our local history, and here she gave us an illustrated account of some of the more unusual things which took place in the county. She categorizes them alphabetically, with a number of events linked together under each letter. She has managed to fill a whole book on the topic, so she only had time to share a few of them with us.

Some examples (very briefly) are for B we had Black – and the author of the novel Black Beauty Anna Sewell was born in Gt Yarmouth in 1820, and the novel was published by Jarrolds (the Norwich printers) in 1877. Then for G we had Green – and the village of Congham holds the world snail-racing championship at which the winner receives a silver tankard filled with lettuce leaves. Another example was for K she described a Knight – the one used by Anglia TV as their station identity. She has also managed to find examples for Q – Queen Boadicea of the Iceni tribe and X – for the xenophobia seen in the anti-German sentiment during World War One.

Some of the events were a little gruesome by today's standards – thus there was the last judicial beheading in the country in November 1885, some 130 years after the previous one, when a hanging went terribly wrong (I will spare you the details!). Another is the family tomb of the Hare family in the church of the village of Stow Bardolph where, instead of the usual statue or memorial stone, there is an extremely lifelike wax effigy of the family member, hidden behind the door of the cabinet. These were presented under the letter H for Heads (of course).

So, we had an eclectic mix of people and events from across the county, neatly assembled into pigeon-holes and presented to us in an entertaining manner.
